Immediately after graduation, Don was drafted into the U.S. Army. He attended Officer Candidate School and served for three years as a First Lieutenant before being Honorably Discharged in 1969. After his time in the service, he was employed by Curtis 1000 for 43 years, working in Houston, TX, before moving to Baton Rouge in 1976. Don married his beloved wife, Sue Kenyon, in 1983, and together they raised their six children - Doug Kenyon, Brad Kenyon, Matt Kenyon, Max Franz, Kristin Schexnayder, and Mark Franz. In 1984, Max was tragically killed by a drunk driver. In his retirement, he worked at Clegg's nursery for three years during their busy Spring season. He credits Butch Drewes with expanding his knowledge of plants. In his spare time, he played a decent game of tennis and a miserable game of golf. Bob Williams was a special friend and neighbor for fifty years.
