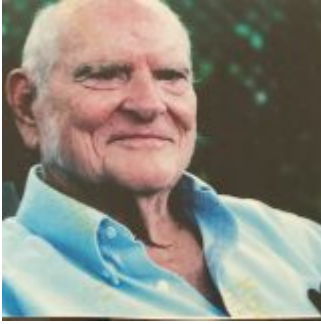


William Orin Flowers, Jr.
